Firstly, we are very pleased to announce that Claire Dawson has been appointed as the permanent headteacher of East Tilbury Primary School from 1<sup>st</sup> July 2025. Claire has worked at East Tilbury since the trust started in 2012 and was one of our first trustees on the original trust board. We look forward to her taking East Tilbury on the next phase of its educational journey. To support the Executive Headteachers – Primary in their work across schools, we are pleased to confirm that Emma Coakley and Lisa Davies are confirmed as the permanent heads of school at Stanford-Le-Hope Primary School and Thameside Primary School respectively. In September, Joanne Matthews will be seconded from Horndon-on-the-Hill Primary School to become the interim Head of School at Arthur Bugler Primary School. Joanne comes with significant leadership experience and has been leading on the NPQ Leading Primary Maths. We wish her all the best in her new role.

During this academic year, we have experienced Ofsted inspections in all our RAAC affected schools. The Trust is in the position of having 12 good schools and we now look forward to developing our Trust Aspirations in 2025/26 to prepare for the new Ofsted framework and build an exemplary trust.

Congratulations to our primary schools on a really good set of Key Stage 2 results. The hard work and dedication of all our teachers in supporting the pupils in their achievements is much appreciated. The improvement in Maths is particularly welcome as this has been a whole trust focus this academic year.

I would like to remind you that the Trust buys into the Education Support Partnership Employee Assistance Programme. It is a free, confidential support service which provides information and advice 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. The phone number for this service is 08000 856 148. I would like to encourage you to use this wellbeing support if you need free counselling or financial advice. A leaflet is attached to the end of this newsletter.

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## RAAC

We continue to make good progress on the St Clere's School new build project. We are coming to the end of the feasibility stage and moving to the procurement stage which is where we work with the DfE to obtain the main contractor. This is a lengthy process and can take anything up to 12 months. This is a really exciting project as in the end we will have a brand-new state of the arts building that meets the needs of all our students.

We are working closely with our Technical Advisors on producing a Project Executive Summary (PES) for the DfE as part of new build project at Thameside Primary School. We are hoping to be able to start works on site in summer 2026. This project will see the removal of the current demountable classrooms, which will be replaced with permanent classrooms within the new block.

We expect the new build projects at East Tilbury Primary School and Arthur Bugler Primary School to come on line in 2026.

## Capital Projects

With the capital funding the Trust receives, we continue to invest in our estate. Over the summer we have a number of large projects taking place across some of our schools. The six- week closure is an ideal time to carry out these works as it causes the least disruption. Some of the projects being carried out are replacement toilets, ceiling and lighting replacements, new roof, classroom enclosures, CCTV installation.

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## STEAM Update

This academic year has marked a dynamic and pivotal period for STEAM across our Trust. One area of development was around real-world engagement, and we've strengthened ties with local businesses and community partners. One standout opportunity has come through the Lower Thames Crossing Project, which received formal approval in May. As a result, we're now able to collaborate with the project's education team, who have already carried out multiple school visits in designated priority areas chosen based on their proximity to the development and the anticipated impact of the tunnel. Pupils gained an understanding of the machinery involved in the project and were introduced to key areas such as health and safety, construction, engineering, and the vital role of sustainability in today's world.

Another hugely successful moment was a visit to the Bett Show at London's iconic ExCel Centre, which was a first for the Trust. Having pupils from year 6 and sixth form provided an opportunity for them to be inspired by cutting edge technology and get a feel for future digital learning. The freebies were also well received!



Twenty Year 6 pupils attended the Primary Engineer celebration event at Ford Dunton. Here they had to discuss their tower design and construction processes with Ford Engineers, as well as taking part in the tilt and drop test. The process was thorough, and three pupils were runners up for overall best tower, earning a medal and certificate in the process. We are so proud of our engineers.

All our schools have worked with TechSheCan who have run workshops focusing on communication in space and robotics. They primarily aim to engage girls in STEAM related subjects as they are underrepresented in industry. A female engineer from Airbus also hosted a live event where over 600 KS2 pupils across the Trust had an opportunity to recognise her journey into the world of aerospace and were able to have an engaging Q&A session.

These are some of our STEAM activities that have taken place this academic year and have had additional learning opportunities by Primary Science Teaching Trust for British Science week, internal workshops on AI, aspirations week and staff CPD. We have also continued work with the Royal Society, Digit<all> and Amazon.



Next academic year we look forward to Discovery Week at Port of Tilbury where students will go behind the scenes at one of UK's most vital and fast paced sectors over the course of five days. Areas they will explore include operations, engineering, marine and green skills and will get an amazing insight into career paths and practical next steps. We will also have a focus on transition in Computing and Science where the work has already started to ensure our learners secure the best possible opportunities during this phase and beyond.

A huge thank you to all staff, pupils, families, and partners across the Trust who have played a part in making this year such a success, we couldn't do it without you.


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## Arthur Bugler Primary School
